Illegal construction on the corner of Huntingfield/Falconwood Road

About three months ago the green belt between the junction of Huntingfield/ Falconwood Road leading to Lodge Lane was stripped bare of its greenery. What was termed as a 'clearing job' to tidy up the overgrowth, transpired into the pathway being cleared of all vegetation & trees to be replaced with an access road with possible intention to be tarmacked. Metal gates were erected to restrict access to the pathway that has been used by local residents for over half a century.

In the process of the work that went on for over 3 week in Oct 2021, significant damage has been done to the council-owned verge. The work carried out breaches the building standards and guidelines. This was clear when no drainage was built around the newly laid roadway further increasing the risk of localised flooding. The newly laid roadway was almost a foot higher than the original pathway as it has been laid above the damp proof course of existing homes.

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Chairman's report

I wish you all a happy and healthy New Year with hope of a better 2022.

I hope you all were able to have as an enjoyable festive season as the circumstances allowed. We are still in the grip of the Corona-19 pandemic with the new variant Omicron, and restrictions on the way we live are still in place, but hope is on the horizon with the lifting of most restrictions in the near future.

The first 9 months of the year was fairly quiet. We had our monthly Zoom Committee meetings and dealt with the day to day business of the Association, then in the middle of October things started to happen.

A gentleman named Stuart Barrs put up a tall gate across the path leading up to New Addington and started laying a road over the small field next to 1 Falconwood Road. Mr Barrs claimed that he owned this piece of land and the path. Croydon planning was contacted and the work was stopped.

The planning inspector from Croydon did first agree with Mr Barrs that he owned the land, even the grass verge. This has since been proved not to be true. The land is owned by Devogrove Ltd. We have been in contact with Mr John Cowling, a director of Devogrove and he was shocked at what had been done to their land. Devogrove want the land to be restored to how it was, but that will probably be a long drawn out battle.

We will keep in close contact with Devogrove and Croydon Planning as the planning inspector in question seams to have accepted the fact that the land, including the grass verge, is not owned by Mr Barrs.

We will try to get the path going from Falconwood Road to Lodge Lane, New Addington, made into a Right of Way. To do this we need statements from residents affirming that the path has been used regularly over the last 20 years by residents. I regularly used it to walk my dog. I ask that all that have used this path over the years to make a written statement and either e-mail or post it to us.

We would like to thank our residents for the support for the fighting fund and the support given to the Committee in the way we have handled this matter so far.

On a personal front I want to thank everyone that helped to make the Christmas lunch for the elderly at Addington Methodist Church so special this year.

I would also like to remind everyone that Addington Methodist Church is collecting food for the Vine Foodbank at New Addington every first Saturday of the month. There is also a Coffee morning at the same time so why not call in for a cup of coffee and a chat at the same time.

Please all stay safe, follow the guide lines and hopefully the infection rate will subside.

Concerns were raised with the workers on site. Multiple attempts were made to have a dialogue with the person who commissioned the works to get a response on how the concerns were being addressed. But to no avail.

Local residents and the ARA raised the matter with the local council, as a result of which planning officers attended the site and instructed the works to be suspended until further notice. That order was flouted as work continued after the planning officer left and they even turned up to carry on with the work the following day. It was only after intervention by local residents to remind them of the council order that the work stopped. However, they came back one morning to intimidate the residents and made a direct thread to the owner of property 1 Falconwood Road.

The ARA was in constant touch with the local council to ensure the matter was being prioritised. In the coming days, it was found that the person who claimed to be the owner of the pathway only really owns a piece of land towards Lodge Lane. It is understood that the person who owns the pathway has been identified and is working closely with the authorities to understand why false claims have been made on ownership.

Throughout this process, no documents of ownership, or approved planning permission have been shared by Stuart Barrs who commissioned these works. It came to our notice that he raised with the council that the residents were in the wrong by being disruptive. Again he has no credible proof to back his false claims. In all honesty, this would not have transpired into a dispute if he had secured proper planning permission prior to starting any work. Or even ensured he was the legitimate owner of the piece of land he was carrying out work on.

While preserving our green space is a motto adopted across the globe to fight the immediate threat of climate change, this work was commissioned to rob the green belt of its flora and fauna. Several deer have been spotted frequenting the green belt, but now the site lays bare and the green has been replaced by hardcore.

ARA had been the rock solid support in this process and has led the way to fight it, and timely raise and chase matters. The focus now is to be able to restore the green belt to its former glory, and the ARA is in constant touch with the appropriate authorities to get this matter closed.

It's commendable how the local resident stood together and supported each other in these mentally taxing times which many a times caused anxiety and anger. It's truly a blessing to be part of a community which has strong foundations of making the residents feel part of one big family. This ordeal has only strengthened the bonds.

Addington Airfield - Milne Park

I'll set the scene. I was carrying out research into local airfields as part of my video series that I share on YouTube. The focus was on the site of the former Hamsey Green Airfield in Kingswood Lane (Gardner's Airfield), but to my surprise I discovered there was another airfield much closer to home so I decided to research it and tell the story.

The 1930s saw a huge growth in aviation. Powered flight was still relatively new and during World War I its development extended much further leading to air combat battles, but the 1930s is where it really took off (sorry, I couldn't resist that).

At that time Sir Alan Cobham ran a touring air show across the country (often referred to as a "Flying Circus") with the aim of showing people how great flying was and to promote the industry in general. His slogan in the show Programme was "Making the Skyways Britain's Highways". The shows had a variety of displays including aerobatics, parachute jumps and wing-walking – they were very popular. There are some photos online showing some of the flights including one in the Addington area – search for "Britain From Above".

The story of Addington Airfield starts with an application being made to use the land at Milne Park. In many ways this was an ideal location, at least before the growth in housing. A long and fairly wide field past the main shopping area, it was deemed perfectly suitable.



The application was initially rejected by Croydon Corporation but later overturned by the Ministry of Health. Now I can guess what some of you may be thinking . . . it turns out that the Ministry of Health Act 1919 had a clause in stating it should "take all such steps as may be desirable to secure the preparation, effective carrying out and co-ordination of measures conducive to the health of the people" — quite a wide brief. It took over the functions of the Local Government Board and some of its key responsibilities were Planning, Housing and Environmental Health.

What this all meant in practice was that they had the sway to turn aside the Croydon Corporation decision and approve the opening of the aerodrome. So Addington Airfield was developed. The Air Ministry officially sanctioned the use of an airfield on the site in 1932.

Aircraft sales agent Henly's established a flying training and maintenance airfield on the site after the plan was initially refused, but they didn't stay long, moving to Heston in 1931.

The airfield was used as a landing ground for aircraft from Croydon and in 1933 by British Air Transport for training.

It was however only viewed as temporary and finally closed in 1936 when the whole area was seen as a much-needed housing area, as it remains today albeit retaining the field and play facilities.

When I visited the area to make my short video it was very easy to visualise the existence of an airfield. But with Biggin Hill only 2 miles away and more able to support the growing need to plan for World War II it made sense to shift the focus in the Milne Park area to building housing.

I don't have any official photographs of the area at the time and if anyone can provide some or any other artefacts, I would be very grateful.

There is a very rich history in this area some of which I continue to investigate for potential short films. I am sure that during the research process many more surprises will come to light!

- report ANY incidences to the police
