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Chairman's Report

In the spirit of the festive season, why not reminisce about the joyous celebrations of Christmas and the welcoming of the New Year. Many in our community here came together to spread cheer and kindness, exemplifying the true essence of the holiday season.

The year 2023 was a testament to our community's resilience and unity. The use of the various local WhatsApp groups has allowed many residents to sell, give-away or swap a large range of items from garden items to furniture to clothing. I picked up some lovely free plants from Featherbed Lane and bagged a bargain kitchen stool as well! All these freebies throughout the year have helped some of us declutter, helped those struggling with finances and helped the environment by reusing and recycling everyday items. Well done to those involved in these giveaways and long may it continue.

Another successful way to rid your house clutter was taken up by twelve households last year when the ARA Committee organised its very first Boot Fair - or Jumble Trail as it became known. Residents were invited to place tables outside the front of their house and place items for sale on them. Effectively a home Boot Sale, it became a Jumble Trail as many residents walked from one house to the next seeking out bargains. Again, Richard and I managed to pick up some bargains but, more importantly, managed to rid the house of a LOT of unwanted items. Everyone that got involved contributed a small fee to the ARA in exchange for promoting the event and this year I am confident the event will be even bigger as it will be held on Easter Sunday, 31st March 2024. Challenges last year included what appears to be an increase in crime as more and more of us share incidents caught on CCTV or Ring doorbells. The committee have met with the local police contacts on numerous occasions and discussions are still under way as to how best to tackle this issue. Another challenge in 2023 was the planning application the council received for the plot of land the entrance of which is on the corner of Huntingfield and Falconwood Road. As most will know, the land was damaged, and gates put up illegally and without the landowner's permission before the committee were able to take action. Thanks to the efforts of a large number of residents, the council finally rejected the planning application, but an appeal may be lodged. The landowners met with committee members and have expressed an interest in developing the land. This may be a long-term plan, but the Committee will keep the residents informed and consulted at every stage.

We recently received this lovely letter from a very proud family in Falconwood Road:

On Remembrance Sunday 2023, Matthew Pollard played the last post on Falconwood Road raising funds for the Poppy Appeal. Matthew has been playing the trumpet since he was 7 years old, he is now working towards his grade 8 exam and plays with the Bromley Youth Concert Band and Symphony Orchestra.

He is also in a Big Band and is now readying himself for a series of concerts playing pieces including Cole Porter's 'Night and Day' and Simon and Garfunkel's 'Bridge over Trouble Water', 'Vltava' by Smetana and Irving Berlin's 'White Christmas'. We are incredibly thankful for the support and generosity of the neighbourhood. He raised £334.76 in total and the British Legion has now received the funds raised.

"As a result of Matthew's fundraising he was nominated for a Bromley Rotary Club Youth Award... and he won it! He will be attending a ceremony held by the Mayor of Bromley in January to collect his award for charity work.

The Vine Foodbank

An Interview with Emma Spencer of the Salvation Army

When did The Vine Foodbank start and why?

The Salvation Army in New Addington has always supported people in need, and that often required food parcels. Initially we worked out of a small room at the back of the church building but as need increased, we felt a more formal expression of food support was needed. In short, I approached the council to ask if they had a building we could use to open as a foodbank. They offered us the building now known as The Vine. It was initially a scout hut and the building was in bad shape, but we rallied some volunteers and approached local groups and businesses for help. With a new kitchen, some new toilets and a fresh coat of paint we opened The Vine in 2014. We chose the strapline 'More than a foodbank' with the intention of supporting those referred to us with more than a food parcel; signposting clients to other helpful services so that any issues behind the food poverty could be addressed.

Why did the Salvation Army choose New Addington for a Foodbank?

The Salvation Army in New Addington has a heart to serve the community within which it resides and so the foodbank is an expression of the love the church has for the community.

How has the Foodbank changed over the years?

Very little has changed other than some small tweaks in the way we work. We are always trying to work more effectively and are constantly reflecting our practices, ensuring we are meeting needs but also being good stewards of the food and financial donations we receive.

Who qualifies for this service?

The foodbank operates using a referral system. This allows for those who know the clients and their circumstances to verify that they are genuinely in need. If someone does turn up without a referral, we give them an emergency one day bag of food and encourage them to get a referral so we can help them further. Our referral partners have expanded to include many different organisations and professionals and include schools, churches, childrens' centres, social services, DWP, Croydon Council, GP surgeries, health visitors etc. We ask partners to give a brief reason for referral and reasons tend to be low income, loss of income, physical illness, mental health illness, awaiting benefits, etc.

We stress that this is emergency help, so parcels are given either as a one off or for four weeks of consecutive weekly support for those whose needs are greater. For

those who have No Recourse to Public Funds we offer weekly support until such time as their circumstances change.

How many does the Foodbank help?

Our numbers fluctuate but we currently help around 24-30 families a week. Numbers usually increase in the weeks running up to Christmas and into the New Year.

Where do donations come from?

We have three collection points for the foodbank. These are Sainsburys in West Wickham and Selsdon and Lidl in New Addington. We also have churches in the community and further afield who give regularly and individuals who also donate. At certain times of the year, such as Harvest and Christmas, we have donations from schools and churches. We also receive regular support from Purley Food Hub.

How much food do you get through?

Each client is given several bags of food and a bag of toiletries and cleaning products. Large families get extra bags. On average a family will leave with three bags of food and a bag of toiletries. So currently in a week where we have served 30 people we would have given out approximately 80-100 bags of food and 30 bags of toiletries. We also have children's clothes, coats for men, women and children and household items.

How many volunteers and hours?

We have about 30 volunteers on the rota. Some help each week, some help once a month and some help us when we are really short of manpower! The foodbank is open for an hour on Tuesday evenings for food sorting, dating and shelving. Wednesday and Saturday's the foodbank serves clients for two hours from 10am -12 noon. We also have volunteers who pick up from the supermarket every week. At Christmas we run a large program supplying food and gifts for 200 families and then many volunteers and many hours are needed!

Plans and hopes for the future?

In an ideal world it would be lovely if we no longer needed the foodbank but sadly,



we don't anticipate that happening. So our hope is that we can continue to support those who need help and that we can play a part in helping people to move from living in a place of need to living in a more comfortable position. Ultimately we want people to leave feeling loved and cared for!

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Can we be more neighbourly?

I recently received a thankyou letter from a Charity I have long supported, which among other work in developing countries helps to provide resilience, disaster prevention and support towards self sufficiency. There was a little leaflet included 'Would you know what to do in an emergency' with the suggestion to fill in the card with numbers of home insurance, doctor, energy supplier etc. and to pin it on the fridge. However, the final line gave me pause for thought; the number of a trusted neighbour who might I call on, not only in an emergency but for issues not appropriate for professional help.

We have lived in Falconwood Road for almost 12 years and feel very comfortable here. We enjoy the convenience, with nearby shops and transport and also the proximity to the countryside as we love walking and exploring the footpaths. We do know a few neighbours but it has not been easy to feel a real sense of friendship except for a few. If we were in difficulties I am not sure that I would feel able to ask for help. We are fortunate to have my children not far away but not everyone is in that position and people could feel very alone and at a loss.

This reminded me of a group that we belonged to in the past called LETS (Local Exchange Trading System). The idea is that those who belong to the group do so on the understanding that they will trade either goods, their time or skills freely. This could take the form of babysitting, offering spare garden plants, lending tools, feeding pets when owners are away, IT advice etc. The possibilities are endless and sometimes those less mobile or active can offer in other ways such as knitting, or advice about repairs etc. The point is that everyone feels able to ask for help if they need it because the system is for mutual support and not dependent on money.

One example from our former LETS group was of one member, a single man who broke his leg. For a couple of weeks he really needed help as he had no family nearby, but his skill was IT. The system is not quite like bartering, where the exchanges are immediate, but go towards a balance within the group, as people do not necessarily want something in return at that point, but feel able to call when they do.

The spirit of neighbourliness was apparent during the Covid lockdown when those more vulnerable were dependent on help, but by being able to offer something in exchange feels much more independent and life enhancing. I would hate to think that someone nearby needed help but I didn't know about it. This is the way resilient communities have operated in the past. As human beings we do need each other.

I wonder how other local residents feel about reviving this idea? For those who belonged to babysitting groups it is along the same lines but with broader offerings. I think in order to develop the trust that is at the heart of being good neighbours we need to know each other personally and start with a smallish group (about a dozen) who sign up to the scheme with a list of what they can offer as a start and to discuss how it might work in practice. Maybe then it can be widened to include more people from our neighbourhood

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
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
